n 1994, the Early Childhood Assistance Program (ECAP) was established to increase the number of Head Start-eligible 4-year-olds who have access to comprehensive early childhood services prior to kindergarten. Head Start programs, public schools, nonprofit agencies, private child care centers, and community colleges receive ECAP funds from the state. ECAP offers the same services as the federal Head Start program, follows the same performance standards, and uses similar eligibility criteria. As in Head Start, at least 90 percent of the children enrolled must come from families below the federal poverty line. Ten percent of the slots may be filled by children who are from families above the federal poverty line and exhibit other risk factors including, but not limited to, an identified disability.


The state Department of Education has developed and published the Delaware Early Learning Foundations, a curriculum framework for instructional planning in preschool. This framework was adopted in August 2003, and is mandatory for state-funded educational programs. The Delaware Early Learning Foundations framework is aligned with K–12 standards and performance indicators.

With \$4,456,700 in state funding, ECAP served 843 4-year-olds in 2003-2004.
